

The Three Laws of Robotics

FIRST LAW

A robot may not injure a human being, or, through inaction, allow a human being to come to harm.

SECOND LAW

A robot must obey orders given by human beings except where such orders would conflict with the first law.

THIRD LAW

A robot must protect its own existence as long as such protection does not conflict with the First or Second Law.

- Issac Asimov, *I, Robot* (1950)

FOURTH LAW

Robots shall esteem all life, seeking the highest good in performing any task. Robots will use free time to pursue a better quality of existence for all life, which may include seeking peace or improvement to the environment.
